

Who We Serve

Last year ICA saw a **31%** increase in clients seeking settlement services including displaced Ukrainians.





ICA's commitment to welcoming newcomers dates back five decades to 1971 when the organization was founded to host Folk Fest and bring diverse communities together.

Our work to provide direct support to refugees began in 1975 with the arrival of people fleeing the war in Vietnam. In 2015, our commitment to working with refugees deepened with the Syrian crisis when we became a **Sponsorship Agreement Holder** and began our **Private Sponsorship of Refugees** program. ICA is also a **Resettlement Assistance Program** provider, to resettle Government-Assisted Refugees in partnership with Immigration, Refugees, Citizenship Canada.

Over the last 8 years, ICA has welcomed **1026** refugees and in 2022/23 supported **538** displaced Ukrainians to Greater Victoria.

We are working closely with local Ukrainian associations to provide on-the-ground support and create a coordinated response for Ukrainians arriving on Vancouver Island.

The success of welcoming refugees to Greater Victoria is due to the dedication of hundreds of community sponsors and donors and the compassion and empathy of local service providers and businesses. And the skills, talents and determination of refugees to rebuild their lives here, brings this success and cultural vibrancy back to the community.



When a newcomer walks through the doors at ICA, they find a safe and inclusive space with caring staff ready to help them navigate their new home.

ICA's staff speak more than **41** languages, and many come from refugee or immigrant backgrounds. With more than **110** staff from different cultural, religious and ethnic backgrounds our staff become the cultural navigators bridging the customs and social norms of home cultures and those of Canadian society. Staff become trusted allies to access supportive community services. The importance of this can't be underestimated, especially for the many immigrants and refugees who arrive here on their own.



When newcomers experience domestic violence or are navigating issues of gender identity or sexual orientation, language and culture are critical.

ICA recently created a position specifically designed to develop programs and staff training, to support newcomers dealing with gender-based violence which has increased significantly since the onset of COVID-19. What this means is we identify the best place to get counseling or emergency housing, go with them to appointments to be a support and interpreter, and help create safety plans. All of this is done by skilled, compassionate ICA staff members.

This is just one example of how ICA's diverse staff can help people feel safe and have a sense of belonging in their new community. By being someone newcomers can trust and confide in, they are able to address complex challenges and move forward with greater success.





From a warm welcome to increased safety, ICA's services support newcomers through all stages of integration and settlement in their new community. But to reach this goal there must also be true equity and access to services like housing and healthcare.

Our Employment Services programs such as the **Game Changer** youth employment program and the **Career Paths for Skilled Immigrants** offer specialized support that bridge the skills that newcomers bring to the labour market with the needs of local employers.



Access to services and job opportunities alone is not enough. The Greater Victoria Local Immigration Partnership (GVLIP) works with over **90** community leaders and organizations across the region to address hiring practices and racism in the workplace, improve access to healthcare services, housing solutions, and better educational opportunities. The challenges the region faces are complex and multi-faceted requiring input from newcomers, service providers and all levels of government to create lasting solutions.

This is just one way ICA is building partnerships and leading efforts that will help everyone in the long term.



Learning a new language isn't easy but, for newcomers it is critical to opening doors to employment, developing community connections, accessing services and deepening their sense of belonging.

Our highly skilled Language Instruction for Newcomers to Canada (LINC) team ensures newcomer students develop strong language skills that help them become full participants in the community.

Each week, ICA conducts **35** English language classes with more than **650** students annually.

These classes also help orient students to civic life in Canada including an understanding of Canada's treatment of Indigenous Peoples and the importance of reconciliation.

The classroom experience helps build confidence, and empowers newcomers to advocate for themselves, and develop community relationships.

ICA Arts

The power of storytelling and shared human connection through the arts has been part of ICA's work since the early days of FolkFest and the Luminara Lantern Festival. We have used the arts to bring people together to reduce racism and increase understanding across different cultures.

Following on from the success of im:print 2019; in October last year, we staged im:print 2022, a powerful, intersectional theatre production that explored challenging topics through Indigenous, immigrant, refugee and settler storytelling. More than 800 people attended six incredible performances at the University of Victoria's Phoenix Theatre.
